

in February 1972 - A year later, mainland China and the United States opered "listen offices" in each other's capitals Washington, however, continues to formally recognize the Nationalist government on Taiwan despite this de facto recognition of Peking

Until recent years, the Na government had been recognized by erment of China. But after Taiwan was ousted from its U.N. seet in 1971 in favor of Peking, dozena of nations withdrew recognition from the Nationalists Currently, only 30 nations still recognize, Talwan. In contrast, over 90 nations have es-tablished ties with Paking For Americans, Talwan is a sensi-

tive and emotional leave. Dufing World War II, Chiang Kai-shek refused Japan's offer of a separate

SIGN OF A TOUCH



For one brief moment, the United States once again acted like a great power. In mid May, declaive and direct pulitary action successfully recovered the U.S. merchant ship Mayagues with its 39 crawmon from Cambodian hands

The #har government recalled its ambassador from Washington Prime Minister Kukrit Pri moj denounced the United moj denounced the United States for having "voisted our soveragenty" in using the U.S. base in "Spatiand as a singing point An angry Thai Poreign Ministry official, updip learning that Cambodian boats had been runk by U.S. planes based on Thai soil, called it "puracy" and "madnesse" an action taken with no thought for the consequences to Thailand The Thai government demanded an apploigy from Washington The apology from Washington. The United States responded with a message of "regret" for the action, but no apology. Bangkok accepted it nevertheless.

Bitter Memories Kept Alive

WARSAW It is hard for the casual observer, walking along Warsaw's broad, brightly lit boulevards, to realize that the now-builting capital lay in near-total time 30 years ago But Warsaw, like the phoenis of legend, has risen from the sakes to become perhaps the most impressive and appealing city in the whole communit world.

But the memorise of that most cruel of all human conflicts remain deeply either in both the soil and payons of Poland and the other lands of Esstern Puriops which I have been touring along with Plain Tright Washington governoponent Dester Pauliner

In Warnaw itself, at the site of the old Jewah ghetto, a solitary monument of Swedish granite originally intended to be part of Hitler's Victory, Column ingletin stands as mute testimony to the valuant fighters of the ghotto who challenged their Nari oppressors to a three-week standoff before sealing their inevitable fate

I we hundred miles to the south of Warsaw, the grocount concentration camps of Auschwitz Birkenau are visible for all to see almost in Ahair entirety, especially in the chae of Auschwitz Here, one solds to tour the dominitry blocks, the prison cells, the crematories and the displays of prison life microditions. South African Trade With Europe Sagre

HOHANNESBURG A BITTONE surge in South African busine West Germany has rick eted South African trade with the European Economic Com-munity to record levels. Sixty percent of South Africa's total world trade is now conducted with the ERC. And importer of EFC goods South Africa has taken a lead over Canada, Aus trains and Japan

South African exports to the nine Common Market countries comed from \$1.96 billion to \$2.93 billion between 1973 and 1974 while imports one even more dramatically from \$2.09 billion to \$3.11 billion

1974 aiso saw a remarkable shift in South Africa's trade away from Britain traditionally South Africa's major source of amporta and soward West Germany In 1973 West German exports to South Africa stood in the region of \$293 mil-lion but lept to \$318 million in 1974. This continuing trend puta West Germany shead of Britain as an exporter to South Africa by \$132 million

The anti South African stance adopted by Britain's Labour government has seemingly played into the hands of Britun's competitors in world trade. As Britain, by design as well as negligence, severa the lifelines of her aconomic survival the her economic survival, the continental European economic nowers are hastily cashing in on the situation in a recent development, a French delegation

headed by Mr. Norbert Segard, France's Liternal Trade Minis-ter, arrived in South Africa for the express purpose of strength a helween Frages South Africa

BRUSSELS: To end its neartotal dependence on imported oil, the European Economic Community is about to embark on a multi-billion dollar nuclear

Presently, 50 to 60 reactors are in operation in Western Europe, providing less than 2% of the Continent's energy needs. If present proposals are imple-mented, the number of reactors would quadruple in the next detade. Germany, France, and Britain alone would have over 50 nuclear reactors each. Environmental groups, how

ever, are concerned about the

hazards of such a program. The greater sumber of plants will increase the risk of leaks and malfunctions and will also rame the serious problem of the ave volumes of auclear waste

There is also concern over the westing house's Pressurized
Water Reactor currently responsible for 40% of Europe's nuclear production has come under fire by critics, after several operating and engineering problems have come to light in the United States

Beautiful City A radio controlled nuclear bomb has been carefully concealed near the heart of your metropolas II you distribute 20 million glotlars in small bills to the minority members of your committy within the nest three days, you will be notified of the bomb a location and no herm will befall you or your people However, if you fail to meet these demands, the nuclear device will be denoted. Tens of thousands will be killed your city will be destroyed, and radioactive confimmation will render it uninhabitable Emigrated are the plans for the device. You bomb experts will confirm that I know what I'm talking about — and I'm not landing!

In 1970 a precocrous 14 year old Orlanda, Florida boy sent local officiels a note threatening to annivisite the city with an H bomb if he were not given 41 million. He supplemented his demands with a convincing set of detailed plans that had experts more than slightly worned.

ned. The boy was eventually apprehended, and his nucleer black mell turned out to be a hose. But the very fact that he was able to supply a realistic set of planes for a nuclear bomb sent ripples of concern and unessiness throughout the nation. Were homemade nuclear bombs made nuclear bombs meerer than we defed to admit? Was the day that terrprists go nuclear highteningly close at hand?

Prying Inside Pandors s Box



The Atomic Bomb -How It Works ·

One of the most intriguing and aignificant discoveries of the twenteth century was that atoms could be split or "fissioned." Just before be split or "fissioned." Just before Werld Wer II, scientists found that fast moving substomic particles such as neutrons could cause heavy atoms like uranium-235 to fission into lighter atoms, and also release produgious amounts of energy Equally important was the discovery that the fesioning of a uranium atom that could, in turn, fission other ura-nium stoms in a chain reaction

Therein lies the key to an atomic bomb. All that is required is a sufficient amount of flesionable material to sustain a rapid nuclear the reaction. In such a situation a sud-den release of energy equal to hum-drede or thousands of tone of TNT can occur in less than a milliorith of

In practice, of course, the making of an atomic bomb is not a trivial achievement. A means must be found to bring two or more, "sub-critical" (i.e." non-chain reaction sustaining meable of unnium or plutonium together in one lump in much less than a thousandth of a second. A stower assembly time

would produce a "fizzle" --- a jot of heet and vepor, but not a real ex-plosion. Thus the idea that a man could hold a sub-critical mass of uranium ig each hand and threaten to create an A-bomb by bringing them together is totally unrealistic. 


