At that point the seven-year-old said briskly. "Oh sure, Dad. Whal would you like to know?"

I had visited Prime Minister Kittikachorn of Thailand twice in his residence in Bangkok A not of 200,000, mostly students. overthrew his government, and he fled to the United States. I knew President Thieu of South Vietnam, but he fled to Europe shortly before the North Viet-namese took over Saigon I knew these men When their countries were overthrown, you may be sure I realized the significance of it

One of the most recent government leaders whom I knew was President Rahman of Bangiadesh, who was re-cently assassinated and whose government was overthrown.

But what about the world TODAY? In Europe, the troubles in Portugal and Spain may trigger a resurrection of the Holy Roman Empire in the form of a UNITER EUROPE. Leaders in Europe have long warred a political-military UNION in Europe. They just have not known how to bring it about.

In Partingal communists virtually took over the government, then suffered a temporary setback. But communists never give up or quit. If they stage a comeback, gaining the government in a country that has for centuries been Roman Catholic Rome may take drawing. man Catholic, Rome may take drastic action to unite all Europe

# WHAT WE NEED ARE LEADERS -- NOT FOLLOWERS

Our leaders don't lead, they follow, writes editor Garrier Ted Armstrong In his regular "speaks

Kidnappings, assassinations, bomb-ings, and ithreats of violence to public officials and innocent bystanders have become daily teatures in world news. The recent machine-gun killings of two Yurkhits mithesessfors in Vienna and Parle

similaria and infocent oyearover have become delily features in world news.

The recent machine-gun killings of two Trushish imbaseadors in Vennes and Parle within a few days of each other undersecore the growing-violence.

Other recent attacks demonstrate the sudden terrorist profileration. He disappearance of two American embasey of ficials in Berut, the abduction of several U.S. mittery advisors in the estraction province of Eritres in Ethiopia; the kidnapping of a British consul in Aemara, capital of the same province, the bombing of downtown offices in three American cites all in one-morning, supposedly the work of an underground organization bushing to Puerto Rican independence. In the irran Republic, Dutch industrialet Triede Herrams has authered days of beetings and threats of death from two determined irran Republican Army terrorists. At the tima of this writing he has not yet been freed eithough police and army specialists have surrounded the kidnappers' hideout.

Almost delily, police, public officials, and businessmen (a Megoedes-Benz executive most recently) in Argentina and other stritte-form areas of Letin America are kidnapped or killed by diverse bands of terforsits. In Italy, gangiend terrorems exports mideous from families of kidnapped prominent criticens. And white plane hijackings and the respectuations from being refuge zones for servors transitions, injustatings remein an ever present threat.

What are the odds of stopping international terrorist activity? It's not a positive picture, but not a totally hopeless one sideral at this point.



"Resyyaken Europe's Christian Soul," Paul VI Tells Bishops in Rome Conference

Last month, in an unusually Last month, in an unusually critical reference to the Prosestant Reformation, Pope Paul VI said the 16th-century revolt against the papacy and the resultant religious wars had hampered efforts

gous wars had hampered efforts toward European unity. The Reformation it is a historical fact has contributed to a division. The pupe observed in an address before a gathering of 80 Roman Catholic bishops, cardinals, and prelates.

After reviewing Europe's tor-tuous past, its divisions and wars, he told those in his au-dience that it was their "mission diènce that it was their "mission as bishops in Europe" to 
"reawaken Europe's Christian soul, where its unity is rooted,"

It was the Cathole faith "that made Europe" in the past, the Pontin stressed. In discovering this "secret of its identity" the Continent could then perform the "providential service to which God is still calling it"

Constant Theme:

The theme of European unity and the expected role of the Catholic, church in helping bring it about -- is not a new one for the Vatican. Pope Paul has frequently sohen out on the subject during the 13 years of his pointicate. His predecessors, pupes John XXIII and Pius XIII, also publicly endorsed the creations of a European political community with a supranational community with a supranational

Pope John said Catholics should be "in the front ranks" of the unification effort. Antiqu pating the potential obstacles on the road to unity, he also advised that "the progressive creation of European unity requires the defeat of isolation

and narrow nationalism."
Carrying on the theme, Pope Paul just three months after his election in 1963. likewise strongly endoursed the idea of a united. Europe, asserting that the Vatican. "is persuaded that the great issue of European unity is a duty that must solved positively." He added, "We are also persuaded that the solution of the question, calls. solution of the question calls for the creation of a unified mentality and for the diffusion of a common culture. Without this European unity cannot be reached

reached. The Moreover, Pope Paul suggested that the Roman Catholic faith "can be a coefficiented promparable value for influsing apiritual vitality to that fundamental unified culture that should constitute the animation of a socially and politically uni-fied Europe "

# **CHINESE TELL SCHMIDT:** "UNITY IS STRENGTH"

PEKING, Nov. 1 (REU-TER): West German Chancel-lor Helmut Schmidt left here today in no doubt about the strength of Chinese hopes for European unity in the face of what Peking sees as Soviet ex-

what Peking sees as Soviet ex-pansionism.

At a farewell banquet last night to heard Chine's Senior Vice-Premier Teng Hsiao-Ping make his strongest call yet for West European integration.

History demanded that Euro-pean countries unite, he said.

"Unity is strength while separa-tion invites bullying." Without mentioning them by name. Mr. tion invites bullying," Without mentioning them by name. Mr. Teng accused Russian, "hegemonists" of sopking to divide Europe by force of arms. The chancellor, himself a stem champion of the European Common Market, joined in a loast proposed by Mr. Teng, "to Europe's faity and growing strength".

China's message to Europe

came out loud and clear: Close came out loud and clear: Close ranks quickly to fend off the So-viet militarists. In their speeches, the Chinese were clearly addressing Mr. Schmidt not just as chancellor of West Germany but as a European leader.

While the two sides could agree on the importance of Eu-ropean integration, they pre-dictably failed to see eye-to-eye on international détente, whi

on international detente, which Peking denounces as a dangerous Soviet trick.

But differences over detente Mr. Schmidt reterred to them as "nuances" did not overshadow the trip as it did the visit of Secretary of State Kisninger a week earlier. The chancellor received a remarkably warm reception, especially in a welcoming People's Daily editorial which lauded the German people in language usually repeople in language usually re-served for Peking's Third World friends ()

Bankruptcy for America's largest city is virtually certain; attention now turns to the mopup operations

The whole nation is living beyond its means. The truth is the Ameri-can economy sits on a moun-tainous spile of debt. Public and private debt now iotals more than \$2.8 trillion, about \$13,000. for every man woman, and child in the United States.

child in the United States. The total highers are so, large at to be incomprehensible. But what is comprehensible and important is that the amount of money that consumers banks, and corporations have on hand with which to meet their short-term month-by-month debts is shrinking.

shrinking As more consumers lose the game of financial brinkman-ship, they are filing for bank-ruptcy in record numbers. He Bankruptcy Division of the U.S. courts prognosticates that bankruptcy filings for 1975 will break every record in the book" a total of more than 230.000



Turthermore the amount of cash on hand with which corpo, rations meet the interest pay rations meet the interest pay ments on past borrowing is trending steadily downward What this means is that very few American companies will be able to do much borrowing in the years ahead. # Gun Stamps for the Poor

WASHINGTON: Jonathan Spear and Michael Petit have brought to my attention a state-ment from Harlon B. Carter of the National Rifle Assn. in de-fense of the "Saturday night special" handgun.

Carter told a House judiciary

Carter told a House judiciary subcommittee on crime. "It makes no sense to me why possession of a finely made \$200 handgun owned by a decent law-abiding man of means should be legal, but ownership of a \$40 handgun (Saturday night special) by an equally law-abiding resident of the intercity, who can't afford anything better to protect his family and home, should be a felony."

thing better to protect his family and home, should be a felony."

It is a very interesting point and Spear and Petit have a solution to the problem.

The Iederal government should mistitute immediately a gun stamp program for the poor. The program would work as follows: A family of four making less than \$6,000 a year would apply for gun stamps at the local post office.

All the head of the family would have to produce is his income tax return, and if he would be given the equivalent of \$200 in gun stamps which he could spend at any gun store for weapons and ammunition. The gun store would be reimbursed by the government for the stamps at 100 cents on the dollar.

Some people might argue Some people might argue that the poor would take advantage of the program and use the stamps to buy cheap guns and pocket the rest of the money but while there may be some abuses of the gun stamp program it would still be the best and cheapest way of seeing that no American critizen no matter what his financial status, would be deprived of his right to hear arms.

It is hard to believe that in a It is hard to believe that in a country as gich as ours there are perhaps as many as 50 million people who go to bed every might without a gun under their pillows. Many of the poor are to blame for this condition. They would rather buy food with

would rather buy food with theirmoney than guns. But a majority are not re-sponsible for their plight. Many are jobless, elderly and children. They have tried to acquire guns, but the cost, even for a Satur-day night special, has been beyond their means

beyond their means
In the past, the middle class
has ignored them in the belief
that anyone who really wants a gun should pull himself up by his bootstraps and earn one. But in an urban society during a period of cruel inflation it's not as easy to acquire a decent gun as it used to be. We can no longer stand idly by and say to these poor people. "You can't have a gun unless you buy it yourself the way we did"

yourself the way we did

Gun staffips are the obvious
solution to helping people who
can't help themselves. At first it
would be considered demeaning to some to accept gun handouts from the government. But as time went on I believe that point people would accept und namps in the same way they accept food stamps—as a temporary way of providing their families with they basic necessities of life. They would no longer feel themselves inferior to the decent law abiding man of means who can afford a \$200 weapon. # Tale of the Turkey

Most Americans are acquainted with the turkey shared by both the Pilgrims and the Indians on a day of thankagiv-ing proclaimed by covernor Bradford of the Plymouth Colony in 1621

What most Americans don't know is the derivation of the word "turkey" and the manner in which the festive fowl became associated with the Thankagiving Day holiday.

The trail of the turkey begins long before the English landed on the shores of the New World. As reported by the Spaniards, the turkey, was first found strutting around when Cortex invaded Mixico in 1519. At that time the Azteca ate the turkey soaked in a delicious chocolais sages. chocolate sapes.
When the conquistadores first saw the

when the conquistadores first saw the bird with its chest puffed out and tail feathers spread out in 4 fan, they

thought it was a breed of peacock and named the bird "pavo," later promoting it to "pavo real" or "royal peacock." The "pavo real" was taken to Spain in

The "pavo real" was taken to Spain in 1525 where it became an instant gas tronomic sensation. In Spain, the bird was bred and sent to other countries. As its popularity spread, a curron thing happened to the bird's name. The French called the bird's "dindon," meaning "from India," because the East was where all eastic dishes originated. was where all exotic dishes originated. The Germans gave it the name. Take-kutosch hum. That term passed into the Scandinavian Language as "Latkon." Much laite, the Friglish, confused by the various names given the delectable bird, placed the fuvil's origin as halfway. East, which came to Turkey, and so "turkey."

# JUST WHAT IS "THE CLUB OF ROME"?

In April 1968, a group of thirty individuals from ten countries — scientists, educators, economists, humanists, industrialists, and national and inter-national civit servants — gathered in Rome They met to discuss a subject of staggering scope — the present and fu-ture predicament of man

Out of this meeting grew The Club of Rome, an internal organization that has been aptly described by some as an "invisible college."

Its stated purposes are to loster under" 1 but Inter-Its stated purposes are to foater under-standing of the many varied but inter-dependent components — economic po-filtical, natural and social — that make up the global system in which we sall live, to bring that new understanding to the attention of under, markers and the public worldwide and to promote new policy inf-liative and scton. Since their original meeting, they have held more than fifty. major conferences in cities all around the

major conferences in cities all around the world.

A series of early meetings of The Club of Rome resulted in the initiation of a tree-phased study of the predicament of mankind. The purpose of the project was o examine the complex of problems troubling men of all nations poverty in the midst of plenty, degradation of the environment, loss of faith in institutions, uncontrolled urban spread, insecurity of employment, allenation of youth, rejection of traditional values, and monetary and sconomic disruptions. These factors, collectively called the "World Problematique," were studied on three levels by three teams of experts.

# Phase One

# The Great Quake: When Will It Come?

Throughout history, mankind has been terrified by carthquakes. The ancients believed carthquakes were caused by a whale, a gant mole, or a storm being imprisoned within the carth's interior. In the Middle Ages many people believed an earthquake was a punishment for sin and a warning tip the unrepentant in the 16th century, an Italian scholar suggested that statum of Mercury and Satura be placed on building walls to protect against earthquakes. walls to protect against carthquakes

wain to protect against earthquakes. In modern times, however, the causes of earthquakes have been largely proported harthquakes occur when there is a tudden dislocation of segments of the earth's crust.

# Origin of Earthquakes

Origin of Earthquaken
According to the latest geological theory, the earth's crust—a this sheet of rock about two to three miles thick under the ocean and up to 25 miles thick beneath the continents—is made up of several separate "plates" lying on a rock mantle which descends to a depth of about 1.800 miles. The heavier mantle rock seems to act like a very sluggish fluid on which the crustal plates float. Wherever crustal plates therefore with Wherever crustal plates interface with each other seismologically active zones

Wherever crustal places interfaces with acach other seismologically active acoses are created. Some of the strain generated in these tones is released in, the slow movement of the ground along fault lines. However, when stresses accumulate below and when surface rock-fare "Jucked" together, the energy builds up to catastrophic levels Eventually, the breaking point is reached. The fault san absorb no more energy. The retainding rocks reptire the sides of the fault slip rapidly with respect to each other until equilibrium is restored, and a major earthquake results. Total nuclear war, according to con-entional windom, would be a suicida ventional windom, would be a suicidal exercise in international irresponsibility (In short, nuclear war is unthinkable. The concept of the Balance of Terror and the policy of Mutually Assured Destruction are based on such unthinkability.

\*But now comes acreevaluation by a National Academy of Science study that seemingly concludes that the impact of a nuclear holocaust on nations other than those directly hit by the bombs/would not be so catastrophic as commonly

not be so catastrophic as commonly thought.

The report entitled Long-Term Worldwide, Effects of Multiple Nuclear Feapons. Deconations: concludes rather optimistically that the human species apparently could survive a nuclear exchange equivalent to 10 phillion tons of TNT. That explosive power is about half the total nuclear megatornage of both the US SR. According to Academy President Philip Handler the study predicts the worldwide effects of such an "uni-magniable holocaust" would "be less prolonged and less severe than many had feared."

Yet the very optimism of the report has caused a sourm of controversy The

Yet the very opumism of the report has caused a storm of controversy. The Federation of American Scientists has Federation of American Scientists has publicly denounced the study for encouraging the irrational use of nuclear weapons through a "Strangelovian scenario" in which nuclear war is seen as a viable method of achieving national purposes. The U.S. Arms Control and Disarmament Agency, which had contracted for the \$50,000 study, was so dismayed at the tone of the report that it issued a statement asserting that no aggression nation could faunch a nyclear war without suffering economic and ecological devastation.

Actually, the report contains sufficient information on the effects of a large-scale nuclear war to deter all but the most inhibitation of nuclear nuts. If all-out nuclear war was presented to the report of the re

most utilistic of nuclear nuts If all-out nuclear war occurred, the report con-cludes there would be many serious con-sequences; including: • Widespread, high-level radioactive contamination, especially in the North-em Hemisphere. • A reduction of the earth's ozone layer by about 50% for three years, • Sunburns in 10 minutes.

The principle new cohecpt developed in the report is that the major predicted long-term effects of nuclear war would anot result from the dispersion of colonactive materials, but rather would be the result of an increase in ultraviolet radiation due to a reduction in the earthstoopie of the productive as an additional deterrent to the use of nuclear weapons.

Indeed, the original purpose of the academy's report was to find out whether certain catastrophic hazards from nuclear war might have so far escaped notice. The potential dangers from the destruction of the ozone layer were just the kind of new hazards they were looking for.

But the tragedy is that in rethinking the untilinkable, such findings have partially been obscured by comforting claims that future generations would be subject to only "minimal stress" a decade or so after a nuclear war. 

That believe, is what has begun to happen on a huge scale with people relative to politicians. The world is currently bespattered with politicians who, have betrayed the trust placed in them by those who elected them to wifice, and the sobering fact is that individuals are "switching off" from politics.

Apart altogether from discredited elected representatives, there are enough former dictators and other heads of state who were found to have done reprehensible things while in office to make China's Iriads or Sicily's Mafia seem

like thoroughly honorable organizations.

We bandy the word about bithely, but do we really know what it means what its history was, where theme from and why?

"Democracy has been defined by discionary compilers as a form of government in which Sovereign power resides in the people as a whole and is exercised either directly by them or by their elected representatives. If you go right back through human history you." If find that two main methods of government of the second of the property of the people and a whole and is carried to the people and the people and

is based on force (the government of the many, by the few or even by one), the other is based on persuasion (the gov-ernment of the many by themselves or by their elected representatives)

Emperors goveriged their aimsent empires by force, they had their armies to back them up. The "commion people" had no say in deciding their own future. But in Greece a pew movement began around 600 BC when some city-states set up the first deniforacies. The word itself, comes from two Greek words, demois meaning, "people" and kradien meaning "rule". The males of these city-states would congregate ty discuss problems and decide major issues of their communities (It is feetaps) worth pointing but that women's were not represented, nor were slaved.

The populations of these initial centers of democracy langed from five thousand to ten'thousands, but as populations increased, it became clearly impossible for all the cluzens to gather

together to make community laws. Thus, out of necessity, evolved the idea of representation — trusted individuals being elected to represent the beople.

Inevitably, because of human inclinations, ambition and the desige for power, some of the representatives became little more than mob leaders and abused their positions, and power for their own selfmore than mob leaders and abused their positions and power for, their own self-aggrandizement. Then came threats from the surrounding powerful empire states, and little democracies were ab-sorbed, defeated.

However, a hardy seed had been sown, and democracy as an ideal sur-vived. In time the idea became fact once more as democracies there set up in England, the Netherlands, Italy and the Rhineland. They survived until the cen-tralized European monarchies were es-

tablished.

The British people are proud of the fact that since 1293 they have been received the second of the fact that since [129] they have been electing representatives to the Parliament at Westminister. But though it may seem fraging when reminded of it in 1975, it was only in 1832 that the "middle classes" were given the vote, while hundreds of thousands of moments. while hundreds of thousands of women had to wait for that privilege until 1918!

Germany became a democracy after Germany became a democracy after World War I That democracy crum-bled under the dictatorship of Hitler. Italy had its own dictator in Mussolini. There were other dictatorships, too, in Fitrope Nor should one-forget Sovet Russia which has a system in which all

Russia which has a system in which all, opposition parties were abolushed and rule is by one party only. Democracy has been called the mobilest of political ideals. Among the most famous and frequently quoted words about it were those spoken at Cettysburg by Abraham Lincoln. He said: "We here bighly resolve that government of the people, by the people, for the people, is all not persh from the earth."

Since J. Deoin's time millions of Americans have died in the defense of democracy. So have millions of other nationalistics But now democracy is once more under almost unendurable stress—and again from the inside.

There is a growing cynneism among people regarding the manner in which politicians, great and small, famous and maightficant, have been seen to conduct

politicians, great and small, lamous and insightican, have been seen to conduct themselves in the use of power for their own selfish ends Heads of state, elected representatives, minor local politicians — a disturbing number have shown a fearful proposity for sorruption, for beamtrching their professions and for betraying the trust placed in them by those who voted them into office.

those who voted them into office. It has been happening all over the world. It would be too easy to, name names All of us could do it. But the very ease of being able to do so is itself a terrible indictment of the way, in golitic man, pince he absconds from standards of ordinary decency, gallops headlong toward willing corruption.
